The Great Fire of London started on the 2nd September 1666 (355 years ago!)

Early Sunday morning



The fire starts at Thomas Farriner's bakery on Pudding lane.





Mid Sunday morning

As news of the fire spreads, people run to escape from its path.







Sunday morning

Samuel Pepys starts to record the unfolding events in his diary.







Sunday evening

Houses are pulled down in an attempt to stop the fire spreading.




In 1666, lots of people had houses made from wood and straw which burned easily. Houses were also built very close together.





Early Monday morning

People carry their possessions to safety using boats on the River Thames.








Late Monday morning



Carts are banned from going near the fire.












Tuesday

St Paul's Cathedral is destroyed by the fire.

The fire is finally under control and put out.

The Great Fire of London lasted just under 5 days.





Facts about the Great Fire of London:

Before the fire began, there had been a drought in London that lasted for 10 months, so the city was very dry.

To fight fires during this time, people would have used leather buckets, metal hooks and water sauirts.

When houses were rebuilt, a lot of them were made in bricks instead of wood, and they weren't built so close together.



Sir Christopher Wren designed a monument to remember the Great Fire of London, which still stands today.



Artists who were alive in 1666 painted pictures of the fire afterwards, so we know what it would have looked like if we'd been there too.








Activity: Cut and stick the pictures, ordering the events in
