








On the third day, God created the land and the seas. He also created plants and trees.









On the sixth day, God created animals to fill the Earth. God also created Adam and Eve.

I opened my eyes.




I got dressed.

This week we are focussing on writing in the correct tense (showing when something has happened)





Verbs are key in helping show what tense things are in.


